Director's Note

"How do we feel?" This is a question a random stranger asked of me back when I was in college. I'd never come across a question like that before. It's the "we" part of it. It's not just you or me. We're talking about you AND me. Are we both feeling the same way? How do we feel sad about what's happening in third world countries? How do we feel bitter about our political system? Do we feel grateful for our family and friends? Do we feel disappointed that we were once young and free, but now have to worry about growing up and dealing with everything that is different?

Deaf people, as do many minorities, feel that we are subject to the judgments of others. Sometimes, we feel it would be easier to hide in the proverbial corner. Minority groups find themselves in the same boat. However, I would say that all people, minority or not, are in the same boat. We all deserve to be treated fairly.

Back when I was a wee boy, I was fascinated with fairy tales and of course, Snow White. Made famous by Walt Disney, tonight's performance will have a similar concept but a different approach a la Deaf Culture adaptation. The play is written by a Deaf person, experiencing life in front of you as you sit, watch and learn about a whole new culture. This performance presents itself in a three-dimensional sensory space. As a first time director, my challenge with Deaf Snow White is to immerse and absorb you into a different world. Deaf people and hearing people share various backgrounds and it takes two, one from each community, to figure out that we live in different worlds.

When Seeing Voices Montreal was first established, the founder informed me that she wanted to put on a production of Snow White. I immediately rose to the occasion, because I felt it would be an innovative and unique experience for the general public. How can I convey my world, my reality, onto paper? And then, onto the
